Labor Day is a federal holiday in the United States celebrated on the **first Monday in September** in any given year (i.e. a single day from September 1 through September 7) to honor and recognize the American labor movement and the works and contributions of laborers to the development and achievements of the United States.[1][2][3] It is the Monday of the long weekend known as **Labor** Day Weekend.

Beginning in the late 19th century, as the trade union and labor movements grew, trade unionists proposed that a day be set aside to celebrate labor. "Labor Day" was promoted by the Central Labor Union and the Knights of Labor, which organized the first parade in New York City.

In 1887, Oregon was the first state of the United States to make it an official public holiday. By the time it became an official federal holiday in 1894, thirty states in the United States officially celebrated Labor Day.[4]

Blue Mountain (Kees) Cemetery www.BlueMountainCemetery.com

Andrew F. Kees was born in Washington Co., Pennsylvania in 1817 and died in Umatilla Co., Oregon in 1886. In 1860, he married Nancy Osborne (a survivor of Whitman Massacre) and they settled 2 miles south of Weston. From his farmland Mr. Kees deeded 1 and 9/16 acres for a cemetery site in 1875.

All official records of the Blue Mountain Cemetery were destroyed. Fortunately, Mrs. E.C. Miley and Mrs. O'Neal spent many days researching and reestablishing the county records as complete as possible. The list of burial sites on the website is a compilation of their efforts.

Information on Burials including photos of headstones, some obituaries, and other related historical information can be found on this website. There is also a map on the website.

The original website was a labor of love by Bob Gilliland. It was a miracle that it could be recovered from an archive website with only a few items not recoverable as the domain expired.

The Commission does not have the authority to make decisions without the approval of the City Council:

- The purpose of the Weston Parks and Recreation Commission is to act as an arm of the City in planning and overseeing improvements to the park system in Weston.
- The Commission defined a "Park" as any outdoor recreational space within Weston City limits and any buildings on the site (e.g. Elliott Memorial Park has kitchen and bathroom facilities on the property).
- The Commission does not have the authority to make decisions without the approval of the City Council, but will
 identify problem areas, research solutions, seek grants, and make recommendations to the City Council for approval.
- The Commission shall consist of four members and two alternates (one being a current setting council member).
- Any resident or business of Weston, Oregon and environs of legal age (or with guardian consent) shall be eligible to be elected a Commissioner.
- Commissioners shall be elected by the public present at the annual general meetings of the Commission for a term of three years.

The proposed nonprofit organization will be for all owners of historic buildings whether the buildings are listed on the National Register for Historic Places or not. An initial meeting will be held on Monday, September 13, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. Pacific Time via Zoom

The purpose:

- Discuss organizing as a 501 c 3 nonprofit to be able to apply for grants, seek funding from Foundations, and allow donors to use donations as a tax incentive.
- Develop a list of work that needs to be done on each historic building such as bricks needing repointing, foundation work, windows, etc.
- Prioritize the work that needs to be accomplished for each building and then prioritize the buildings based on work needed. It may be possible to combine work such as brick repointing to cover all of the buildings that need this work done as one project.
- Work with building owners who would like to have their buildings nominated for the National Register for Historic Places.
- Workshops and webinars on historic preservation practices to learn more about preservation.
- Work with local city government(s) to advocate for historic preservation funding for projects.

The meeting will be facilitated by former Weston resident, Trish Neal, who currently lives in Alaska and is the president of *Preservation Alaska*; a 40 year old statewide nonprofit advocating for historic preservation. She serves as the state representative to the national organization *Preservation Action* which advocates for historic preservation.
