With a new year, comes review and renew: reviewing goals and accomplishments in the middle of the fiscal year, and renewing commitments and goals for the upcoming year. The City has been committed to safety, infrastructure, and processes. We have had successes and set-backs.

Safety: increase awareness and public input around the Middle School and seek funding for sidewalk and crosswalk improvements. 

"State of the District" 2017

Season's Greetings and Happy New Year from the Desk of the Medic 400 Ambulance Administrator:

On behalf of the small team of hardworking and dedicated healthcare and emergency services professionals that make up the Medic 400 team, I wish to take a moment and provide the citizens and communities we serve with a snapshot of the District's accomplishments over this past year, provide an accounting of the current position of the District since its re-organization and redistricting, and outline a few of the District's plans for the coming year, as well as, some of the challenges facing the new District.

Background

In 1988, the citizens living within the boundaries of the Athena-Weston School District voted to establish the East Umatilla County Health District to provide local medical and ambulance services during emergencies. Since its inception, the District's Medic 400 ambulance has relied upon the strength, dedication, and professionalism of its hard-working local volunteer staff to provide these essential emergency medical services. In 2016, voters were asked to expand the District's tax boundaries to include the communities of Adams and Helix, as well as, the unincorporated communities of Bingham Springs, Holdman, and Tollgate. Fortunately, citizens within these local communities responded favorably to the District's request and called for the dissolution of the old health district and the formation of the new East Umatilla County Ambulance Area Health District (EUCAAHD). The new health district started operations on July 1, 2017, and today provides EMS services to over 400 square miles within East Umatilla County, covering the area northwest along Highway 37 to the boundary with Umatilla County Fire District #1 and the Oregon-Washington border, northeast to the boundary with Milton-Freewater Rural Fire Protection District, east along Highway 204 to the Umatilla-Union County line, south along the Highway 11 corridor and the boundary of the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation, and southwest to the boundary with Pendleton Fire Department. The District now responds to over 200 calls for emergency services annually and services a year-round population of over 4000 citizens in the East Umatilla County area. The new area for which the District is responsible is referred to as Ambulance Service Area #5 (ASA- 5), or the Athena-Weston ASA.

Current State of the District

Since July 2017, the new health district has taken its direction from the overwhelming local support received and voiced by the voters within our local communities. The District recruited and hired three (3) full-time responders (both Paramedics and Registered Nurses) with collectively over twenty-five (25) years of EMS experience to provide near 24-hour medical coverage to the service area. Additionally, the District continues to foster and maintain its valuable connection to the community by recruiting and relying heavily upon its local volunteer members to augment the Medic 400 team and round-out our response crews. While maintaining a durable, and much needed, working relationship with our EMS partners in Pendleton and Milton-Freewater, the new health district is no longer dependent upon these entities to provide primary EMS coverage and service to our local area. Further, the new district maintains close mutual aid relationships with the Athena Volunteer Fire Department, the East Umatilla County Rural Fire Protection District in Weston, Helix Rural Fire Department, the Umatilla Tribal Fire Department, and the Life Flight Network. Many of the individuals that serve within the ranks of the Medic 400 team also serve within these other fine organizations. As District Administrator, I extend my appreciation and admiration to all of those hard-working and dedicated professionals that regularly give of their valuable time and expertise to help our citizens most in need.

As a further indication of the ongoing strength and health of the District, several recent and meaningful accomplishments must be recognized. In July, the new District successfully applied for and received a license from the Oregon Health Authority to operate an Advanced Life Support (ALS) ambulance within the County. After receiving the support and recommendation of the Umatilla County Ambulance Service Area Committee and the Umatilla County Office of Emergency Management, the Umatilla County Board of Commissioners approved and awarded the ambulance service contract for ASA-5 to the Medic 400 franchise. Despite an unsuccessful search for a full-time administrator, the District currently operates under an acting administrator with ten (10) years of public sector managerial and budgetary experience, and six (6) years EMS and critical care experience, who holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from Willamette University and maintains licensure as a registered nurse in both Oregon and Washington State. The District's EMS Field Supervisor is also a Willamette University bachelor degreed graduate who is an Oregon certified Paramedic with over eighteen (18) years of experience working in high-volume fire and emergency services and maintains board certification as an emergency nurse. Further, the District continues to staff and answer to a volunteer five (5) member elected Board of Directors that governs and provides direction to the District Administrator. Also, the District maintains a respected group of ten (10) dedicated volunteer professional medical responders and CPR-trained drivers that collectively provide critical EMS services within the ASA. Finally, the District continues to enjoy a healthy working relationship with our medical director, Dr. Brad Adams, of Pendleton, who provides and oversees that the medical protocols used by our paramedics and nurses are up-to-date and appropriate for our needs. The District is indebted to Dr. Adams, the EUCAAHD Board of Directors, its employees, and the citizens of East Umatilla County for their continued support of Medic 400. While impressive in its summation, the District continues to seek and encourage the involvement of medical professionals within the area willing to participate and contribute their skills, abilities, and talents to the Medic 400 team.

What the Future Holds

While the new health district has accomplished the needed work to secure its place as an ambulance service provider for ASA-5, continued planning and growth is necessary to ensure that the best medical services are available to our citizens and customers. The District will continue to leverage the many available opportunities for grant funding and other financial resources to maintain and grow the District's capabilities.

For example, the District recently received a generous grant from the Wildhorse Foundation to assist with the purchase of a LUCAS® chest compression device. The LUCAS® device will be used to provide uninterrupted and effective high-quality chest compressions during cardiac arrest emergencies, which has the benefit of freeing up our medical personnel to focus on other life-saving activities for patients, such as early defibrillation, ventilation, IV access, and life-saving medications. Also, discussions with major equipment manufacturers are being initiated to secure the purchase of new cardiac monitoring and defibrillation equipment for the District. Additionally, in the coming budget cycle, the health district intends to pursue an upgrade of its ambulance fleet to replace its aging vehicle inventory. Finally, the District will be focusing on making key infrastructure and long-term investments to better prepare and provide for major medical and catastrophic emergencies within the community and region.

Lastly, as a member of the state's trauma and emergency services resources, the District will pursue a collaborative relationship with the Oregon Health Authority EMS and Trauma Division. In the coming year, the health district will request an audit of its operations to review and provide process improvements to assist with improving and maintaining compliance with all statutory and administrative requirements for ambulance franchisees within the State. As with all audit and process improvement plans, the goal will be to attain an improved and more efficient service delivery organization for the betterment of the District's citizens.

Challenges for the District

While not to detract from the many exciting and promising changes already happening at the Health District, there remain some ongoing challenges that threaten the Medic 400 team and its ability to provide reliable ambulance service to the area. The primary difficulty plaguing the future of the District can be summarized simply: "We need volunteers."

The addition of full-time Paramedic/RN staff to the District has notably enhanced service delivery within the ASA by keeping qualified EMS personnel present to respond to medical emergencies; however, having medical responders "ready to go," has highlighted two continuing staffing challenges for the agency. First, the District's current staff of three (3) full-time employees can provide coverage for only 120-hours within each 168-hour work week without incurring overtime, which requires that District volunteers be available to cover the remaining 48-hours each week. Currently, the District relies on only three (3) advanced life support (ALS) level responders and one (1) intermediate (ILS) level responder to meet this staffing demand. This implies, at a minimum, a twelve-hour commitment each month from each of these volunteer members amidst their already demanding personal and full-time professional lives as medical providers in other nearby communities. Even though the District pays for full-time medical staff, and relies on volunteer professionals to make-up the difference, the continued necessity for medically trained volunteer responders is essential to fulfilling the District's mission of providing reliable local ambulance service. It is important that the District continue to recruit, train, develop, and retain a strong local volunteer medical core.

Secondly, to further underscore the importance of the District's local volunteers, for each call for emergency service received by the District, the Medic 400 ambulance must be staffed, at a bare minimum, with at least one (1) ALS or ILS trained medical staff member and one (1) CPR-trained qualified driver. Ideally, and in most larger communities including Pendleton and Milton-Freewater, both responders would be medically trained, and ambulance drivers would possess medical certification to at least the EMT-Basic level. This means that, although the District pays to have full-time medical staff, a volunteer CPR-trained driver must respond to each and every emergency call for service received by the ambulance, regardless of the time of day. There are currently six (6) qualified drivers that provide this essential service to the ambulance district, requiring a time commitment of more than 24-hours each month by each volunteer. Again, these are hard-working local professionals with full-time jobs that live right here within our communities that donate time from their lives to provide this essential service to the ambulance district. I salute and deeply appreciate the sacrifice made by each volunteer member of our organization.

The problem of fewer and fewer volunteer members with the ranks of the ambulance district is not unique to Medic 400, but rather is a symptom of a continuing reduction in altruism and volunteerism within society at-large. As more and more families struggle to make ends meet, less time remains available for extra-curricular activities such as volunteering. Local governments struggle to find people willing to serve within city councils or planning commissions, special districts and library districts struggle to find people able to serve on boards and committees, and local special interest groups, such as the Lion's club, or the Adams Ladies Club, suffer from fewer and fewer committed members. In the case of the Medic 400 team, the unavailability of volunteers is compounded by the need for these volunteers to have and maintain proficiency within their disciplines so that we might continue to provide the high-level emergency services all of us would want to have caring for our families and loved-ones. While the health district can likely do little to stem the societal influences creating the shortage of free-time in people's lives, the District is committed to continuing to make its presence known within our local area, and making its need for local support, both in time and funding, paramount in its mission such that any able-bodied individual with the desire, ability, skills, and time available can be allowed the opportunity to serve his/her community through the health district.

Conclusion
